# Weekly Disease Surveillance Report



## 2024 Reporting Week 10: March 3 — March 9

This weekly report is produced by the DOH-Okaloosa Epidemiology Section to provide situational awareness to community partners. Data is subject to change as additional information is gathered.

### Updates and Recommendations for the 2023-2024 Flu Season

- According to the CDC, three flu vaccines are preferentially recommended for people 65
  years and older: Fluzone High-Dose Quadrivalent vaccine, Flublok Quadrivalent recombinant flu vaccine, and Fluad Quadrivalent adjuvanted flu vaccine. Based on a review of available studies, these vaccines are potentially more effective than standard dose unadjuvanted flu vaccines for this age group. There is no preferential recommendation for people younger than 65 years.
- The composition of flu vaccines has been updated. Please visit <u>Information for the 2023-2024</u>
  <u>Flu Season</u> to view the make-up of the egg-based and cell- or recombinant-based flu vaccines.
- People with egg allergy may get any vaccine (egg-based or non-egg-based) that is otherwise appropriate for their age and health status. All vaccines should be given in settings where allergic reactions can be recognized and treated quickly.

### **ILI Trends**

Influenza-like illness (ILI) in Okaloosa increased during Week 10, and remains higher than the previous year's level (current level: 4.22%; last year: 2.80%). Please stay vigilant, promote vaccination, and visit the weekly Florida FLU REVIEW.

### In the Know: Measles in Florida

Measles cases have been reported in Broward County, as well as a travel-related case in Central Florida. As of March 7, 2024, a total of 45 measles cases were reported by 17 jurisdictions: Arizona, California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, New York City, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Washington.

Because measles is highly contagious, the Florida Department of Health is providing this <u>linked information</u> to health care providers regarding the identification, testing, and management of suspected cases.

If you suspect measles in a patient with a febrile rash illness, please contact DOH-Okaloosa at 850-833-9065 (or your local <u>county health department</u>) **immediately** and review the linked information mentioned above. Suspected measles cases are required to be reported immediately to ensure prompt response and public health efforts.



## Influenza-Like Illness

### Week 10: March 3 - March 9

Influenza-like Illness (ILI) is defined as fever greater than or equal to 100°F AND cough and/or sore throat in the absence of another known cause.

ANALYSIS: During Week 10, flu reporting partners and ESSENCE (a syndromic surveillance system) reported an increase in ILI activity for Okaloosa County. The percentage of ILI ED visits in Okaloosa County increased this week (3.55% during Week 09 to 4.22% during Week 10). Flu partners reported 29 positive rapid flu tests this week (13 Influenza A and 16 Influenza B). Over the past three weeks, no influenza specimens submitted to the state lab were positive. There were no ILI admissions or deaths reported by flu partners this week. No outbreaks have been reported in the past 3 weeks. The percentage of total ILI ED visits for Week 10 is higher than that of Week 10 last year.

Note: Other respiratory syndromes can be represented by increased ILI case numbers.




Figure 3: Hospital ED visits meeting ILI criteria stratified by facility. Percentages calculated based on total number of ILI ED visits. (n=117). Data source: ESSENCE







Annual comparison for the percent of Injury for all Okaloosa County hospital ED visits week to week for 2021, 2022, and 2023.








Figure 8: **Hospital Emergency** Department (ED) visits from 2024 Week 10 by select syndrome category. Percentages calculated based on total number of ED visits (n=2534) Some syndrome categories are not represented; therefore, represented percentages will not total 100%. Data source: **ESSENCE**




