The OCHD employee's registered, triaged and cared for special needs patients played by our very own volunteers. The "patients" had a variety of special needs and were equipped with props to help in their roles. As the hurricane progressed, so did the needs of the patients. We had wandering patients, upset patients, and even some allergic reactions! Including the fun that ensued with the exercise, OCHD employees applied their response skills and the OWMRC learned the processes of the Special Needs Shelter. In a time of



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The A-B-Cs are now C-A-B ... huh?

The new 2010 American Heart Association **Basic Life Support for Healthcare Providers** course, which includes CPR and AED (Automated External Defibrillator) skills, has incorporated quite a few changes due to research. The newest development in the 2010 AHA Guidelines for CPR and ECC is a change in the BLS sequence of steps from "A-B-C" (Airway, Breathing, Chest compressions) to "C-A-B" (Chest compressions, Airway, Breathing) for adults and pediatric patients (children and infants, excluding newly borns).

Although the experts agreed that it is important to reduce time to first chest compressions, they were aware that a change in something as established as the A-B-C sequence would require re-education of everyone who has ever learned CPR.

OWMRC volunteers can attend CPR classes at Okaloosa County Health Department and get their certification <u>free</u>! Classes are held every month at the health department facilities.

Public Health Preparedness on the Big Screen!

Catch Contagion in a theater today!

The un-informed often wonder what role Public Health and you—our OWMRC volunteers—will play during an emergency. *Contagion*, the movie, explains this well.

The story: Beth Emhoff (Gwyneth Paltrow) returns from a business trip to Hong Kong. Two days later she collapses with severe seizures in her suburban Minneapolis home. Her husband, Mitch Emhoff (Matt Damon), rushes her to the hospital but she dies as a result of an unknown disease. Mitch returns home and finds his stepson Clark has also died as a result of similar symptoms. Mitch is put in isolation but turns out to be immune to the disease. He and his daughter attempt to flee the city, but a quarantine has been imposed and they are forced to return to their home to face decaying social order and rampant looting of stores and homes. Mitch struggles to give his daughter, who has a lengthy wait for a



vaccination and is thus quarantined to their house, a sense of normality while trying to come to terms with his own loss.

In Atlanta, representatives from the Department of Homeland Security meet with Dr. Ellis Cheever (Laurence Fishburne) of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and express fears that the disease is a bioweapon intended to cause terror over the Thanksgiving weekend. Cheever sends Dr. Erin Mears (Kate Winslet), an Epidemic Intelligence Service officer, to Minneapolis to begin the investigation and traceback. Dr. Mears has to negotiate with local bureaucrats reluctant to commit resources and becomes infected with the disease while staying at her hotel. The Minnesota National Guard arrives to quarantine the city, and a badly deteriorating Dr. Mears is moved to the field medical station she helped set up, where she later succumbs.

The movie continues with the search for Patient Zero and a vaccine. Along the way, the viewer sees the many aspects for which Public Health Preparedness plans and responds:

epidemiologic investigations, alternate medical treatment sites, points of dispensing for mass vaccinations, social distancing, quarantine and robust information campaigns.

Not only entertaining, this is a great training flick!
