It is important to stay current with your contact info so in case there is an alert or activation to respond, you are receiving the call, email or text. There is also an App for Everbridge!





Happy New Year! I hope that everyone had a great Christmas and survived the New Year celebrations! Now it's time to get to work on those promised resolutions and reaching for those goals you have set for yourselves!

It has been quite a year so far! Hurricane Irma and Nate responses were our major events in the first half of the OWMRC fiscal year. As we end the first two quarters, I have

to say our MRC has done an outstanding job with your participation in events and in training opportunities. As of this writing, you have provided **694.5 hours** of volunteer time that translates to a value of **\$28,220.21 – OUTSTANDING!** If you remember, your *full-year* amount from the 2016-2017 OWMRC year was 863.25 hours of volunteer time valued at \$35,313.20. If we keep up this pace, our unit could easily break 1000 hours of volunteer time and may top \$45,000 in time value. In contrast, I went back to the 2011-2012 mid-year report and it shows that the total dollar value of MRC Volunteer Services and Donations was \$3,817.33 from 19 volunteers providing 145 hours of service. I hope you all share my excitement over our numbers, and look forward to providing more opportunities for our members to serve the community in Okaloosa and Walton Counties.

Not only have we been busy, but MRC units nationwide has been working hard through multiple natural and man-made disasters and public health threats. Esmeralda Pereira, Acting Director of the Medical Reserve Corps, writes in an email: "This year has been both an extremely busy year and a year of change for the MRC Program. One of the things that has impressed me the most is your ability to support each other – your fellow MRC units – while at the same time responding to the needs of your communities. This willingness and enthusiasm to step up and help is evident every day as you seek advice and share resources and best practices on our listservs, during the Well Check Webinars, and in discussions with each other. It was also clear this fall as our country responded to a historic hurricane season that left many of our communities devastated. More than 50 MRC units were activated or placed on stand-by to support the response efforts to these storms, and countless others asked how they could help and were prepared to deploy should the need and request arise. Your dedication and support of the network and the MRC's mission and to improving the health and safety of our neighbors is incomparable."

# Background Screening

**E**SPONDER

### Update

Without a current background check, you cannot be deployed or participate in any activation or event.

Since receiving our budget for background screenings, I have been busy getting new and existing members completed. I have enough funding budgeted for 11 more screenings. So far we have done 11 Level One screenings, and have 6 Level Two screenings in the works! There are a few more new members that are in the process of completing their online training (required for BGS).

I have also been moving those members who have not responded to contacts over to the inactive file.

The re-screening requires your fingerprints to be taken at a location here in Fort Walton Beach and must be scheduled at least one week in advance. We require that you resubmit the Live Scan Information Sheet, a good color copy of your Driver's License or ID and a color copy of your Social Security Card. Indicate on the Live Scan form what day and time would be best for you to get your fingerprints recorded.

Again, if you are unable to continue your service to our MRC, we do understand. We just want you to let us know that you cannot or no longer want to be a part of the OWMRC. Send me an email and I will close your folder and move you to the inactive database.

### Changes in DOH-Okaloosa and OWMRC Leadership

There are some changes at DOH-Okaloosa that I want to make you all aware of. As announced last quarter, David Brinkley left the Health Department and moved closer to his family in North Carolina. David served our OWMRC first as the Team Leader when he was first hired, and then as Coordinator when he moved into a different planner position. Since he has vacated the position, I have transfered into his position and will become the Coordinator. A new person will be hired for my position at the CHD and will be working as the OWMRC Team Leader.

However, Katie McDeavitt, our OWMRC Director feels that it is in the best interest of our group that some of the responsibilities that I currently have within the structure of the unit be continued. I will have the big picture look of our organization, continuing the strategic planning and overall operations of the group. I will still be publishing *The Responder* Newsletter, and continuing to work to grow our membership through recruitment events and community partnerships.

When our new planner is brought on board, you will have the opportunity to meet him or her at our mid-year meeting and share your expectations with the new Team Leader then. I know that consistency is important to our group, and we will be working to maintain that consistency and continuity during the change. Please be patient with us!

In early December, the "MRC:2017 Year in Review" was released. It is an excellent document and can be found at this link: https://www.naccho. org/programs/public-health-preparedness/ medical-reserve-corps/mrc-network-profile. The publication has some great statistics on the many accomplishments of our nationwide MRC units made during the year. In addition to the fifty units that activated for the hurricanes, there were more than 25 units that supported community viewing events for the total solar eclipse over the summer; 12 MRC units supported wildfire efforts in Northern and Southern California: attended or hosted approximately 125 "Until Help Arrives" or "Stop the Bleed" training events; and MRC units across the country participated in more than 300 activities related to combating the opioid crisis (community education and outreach, Naloxone distribution and training, and safe prescription drug disposal).

And something many of you may not know... 2017 is the 15-year Anniversary of the Medical Reserve Corps. Organized in 2002 after the September 11th attacks, the MRC has become a valuable member of the response community during times of public health emergencies and disasters. Many MRC units are specialized with specific duties like veterinarian services, disaster behavioral health teams, specialized rescue teams, and others.

Closer to home, we continue to provide preparedness services to our many vulnerable populations through our Lean On Me Project, providing training to faith-based partners on the LOM curriculum to assist with further outreach, expanding our membership in order to carry-out our missions if deployed, providing training to the community through the "Until Help Arrives" curriculum and train additional OWMRC members to be able to deliver the class as needed.

I am very proud to report that we have 70 deployable members, and have 28 in Researching Status. I continue to work on getting those in Researching Status moved over to Deployable. If you are not sure what your status is, please contact me and I will let you know. Many of you know that we are waiting on a new badge printer, and because you many not have a OWMRC ID Card, doesn't mean you cannot be deployed. We will get those to you as soon as possible.

Also, if you are unable or no longer wish to be a part of our MRC unit, please let me know via an email so I can close your file and remove you from our active database. Many folks move, or get orders to another area. If you have moved from the Okaloosa or Walton County area and are interested in joining another MRC unit close to where you now live, I can get you the contact information for the closest unit to you. There are just under 1000 MRC units nationwide. And like ours, I'm sure they can always use you in their organization. If you know someone that is looking for a volunteer opportunity and feel like they would be a good fit in our membership, give them a copy of this newsletter and have them contact me via my email or have them fill out the form on the last page and mail it back or scan and email. I will get them the information needed to sign-up and get started.

In the remaining two quarters, we will have a lot of opportunities for service. The mid-year meeting at the end of January or first part of February, Special Needs Shelter Set-up and Tear Down and Operational Training around Spring Break, Feed the Need Meal Preparation Event in May, and Hurricane Preparedness events in May and June. We will continue our Lean On Me Project visits and the team can use more help. Please consider contacting our Lean On Me Project Coordinator Peggy McDeavitt and see where you can be of most assistance. Into the summer, I want to try and get our folks involved early in our back-toschool immunization clinics. Needed training and scheduling will have to be accomplished ahead of time so we can seamlessly integrate into the systems and procedures.

We will need to start thinking about election of Board of Advisors members at the end of this fiscal year. This will give us about six months to identify those members who would be able and willing to serve on this important board. Current Board Members are certainly eligible for Board nomination and continued service.

Personally, I want to thank all of you for your continued commitment to the OWMRC and our mission of service in times of need.

Medical Reserve Corps units are community-based and function as a way to locally organize and use volunteers who want to donate their time and expertise to prepare for and respond to emergencies and promote healthy living throughout the year. MRC volunteers supplement existing emergency and public health resources.

The year 2017 marks the 15th anniversary of the creation of the National Medical Reserve Corps, which was announced during President George W. Bush's 2002 State of the Union address and officially launched as a demonstration project in July of 2002. In the first 10 years, the program grew to over 200,000 volunteers in almost 1,000 units across the country—ready to respond to emergencies and building resiliency in thousands of local communities through prevention, preparedness and public health activities.
